

Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19): Booster Doses for Pfizer, Moderna and Janssen Vaccine Recipients ODP Announcement 21-078

AUDIENCE:

All interested stakeholders

PURPOSE:

To announce recent recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) about booster doses of COVID-19 vaccines. All three available vaccines, Pfizer, Moderna, and Janssen (Johnson & Johnson), now have available guidance regarding booster doses.

DISCUSSION:

On Thursday, October 21, 2021, the CDC issued a recommendation for Moderna and Janssen booster doses for certain groups of indviduals. This is in addition to the CDC's earlier recommendation on September 24, 2021 for the Pfizer booster dose.

The CDC issued the following <u>guidance</u> for booster doses for indivudals who received their Moderna or Pfizer primary series at least six months ago:

• people 65 years and older <u>should</u> receive a booster

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•	residents in long-term care settings aged 18 and above should receive a
	booster

- people aged 50–64 years with underlying medical conditions <u>should</u> receive a booster. The underlying medical conditions identified by the CDC include:
 - Cancer
 - Chronic kidney disease
 - Chronic lung diseases, including COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease), asthma (moderate-to-severe), interstitial lung disease, cystic fibrosis, and pulmonary hypertension
 - Dementia or other neurological conditions
 - Diabetes (type 1 or type 2)
 - o Down syndrome
 - Heart conditions (such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, cardiomyopathies, or hypertension)
 - HIV infection
 - Immunocompromised state (weakened immune system)
 - Liver disease
 - Mental Health Conditions

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- Pregnancy
- Sickle cell disease or thalassemia
- Smoking, current or former
- Solid organ or blood stem cell transplant
- Stroke or cerebrovascular disease, which affects blood flow to the brain
- Substance use disorders
- people aged 18–49 years with underlying medical conditions <u>may</u> receive a booster based on their individual benefits and risks
- people aged 18-64 years who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting <u>may</u> receive a booster shot, based on their individual benefits and risks. <u>This</u> <u>includes all residents of Intermediate Care Facilities (ICFs) and licensed</u> <u>community homes, all direct service professionals, provider staff, and</u> <u>supports coordinators.</u>
- The CDC guidance recommends a booster dose for all individuals who are 18 or older who received a Janssen vaccine as their primary dose at least two months ago.

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- Any brand of vaccine may be given as a booster dose regardless of the brand of the individual's primary series.
- The Pfizer and Janssen vaccines are the same product and dose as the primary series, but the <u>Moderna vaccine is a half dose</u> of the same product when compared to the primary series.
- Eligible individuals are now able to schedule appointments and receive booster doses.
- The Office of Developmental Programs (ODP) will not be coordinating vaccine clinics for booster doses.

Residential Providers

- Residential service providers are expected to identify a vaccine provider or have a plan for vaccinations of residents, which includes obtaining booster shots for eligible residents.

Preparedness Checklist for Long-Term Care (LTC) Facilities

- **Evaluate the needs of your population.** Regardless of which vaccine your residents and staff received they can receive any vaccine as their booster.
- **Consider eligible healthcare staff** as potential recipients of booster doses (or a primary series if not yet vaccinated) as well.
- Work with local pharmacies and providers to hold booster clinics, and administer doses in your facility if possible. Any LTC facility that does not have a
