







COVID-19 Delta Variant



- Main strain in new cases in India and the United Kingdom
- In US, accounts for more than 50% of new cases, up from 6% in early June.
- mRNA vaccines appear to be effective against the Delta variant, but the vaccines may be less effective than against other strains.
- Important to have both doses of the mRNA vaccine for protection against the Delta variant.



- Delta is more contagious than the other virus strains
- Unvaccinated people are at risk
- Delta could lead to 'hyperlocal outbreaks.'
- There is still more to learn about Delta
- Vaccination is the best protection against Delta

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Guidance Evolution

- Prior to May 2021, ODP worked with PA's Department of Health to provide guidance to maintain consistency of health and safety guidance across service locations.
- The CDC updated guidance to include all ODP service location types in May 2021.
- ODP Announcement 21-048 COVID-19 Update: Guidance for Infection Control and Mitigation for ODP Home and Community Based Services Providers
 - ODP obsoleted previous guidance and replaced with an announcement that provides context and points to appropriate CDC and DOH guidance



Guidance Evolution (cont.)

- ODP does not anticipate developing and issuing guidance for Infection Control and Mitigation; rather
- Providers will need to become adept at implementing applicable CDC and DOH guidance

Guidance for Direct Service Providers

- Follow <u>everyday prevention actions</u> when working with clients without suspected or confirmed COVID-19, and <u>healthcare</u> <u>provider guidance for standard and transmission-based</u> <u>precautions</u> when providing care for clients with COVID-19.
 - When possible, keep at least 6 feet of distance between yourself and others in the home or community setting.
 - Wear a mask when you are at work.
 - Encourage your client to wear a <u>mask</u>.
- If you work in the home of an individual with disabilities...
- If you provide services for a client *in a community-based setting*, such as a group home or day program...

 Additional guidance for LTCFs, which can be more conservative than what is recommended for other healthcare settings, is necessary due to the increased risk of transmission and increased risk of severe health outcomes related to COVID-19 in this setting.



Core prevention measures for COVID-19 in long-term care facilities in Pennsylvania include:

- 1. Infection prevention and control program
- Vaccinate residents and HCP against SARS-CoV-2
- 3. Implement universal source control and eye protection
- 4. Implement physical distancing measures
- 5. Implement source control and physical distancing options for fully vaccinated persons
- 6. Have a plan for visitation
- 7. Evaluate residents at least daily
- 8. Create a plan for testing residents and HCP for SARS-CoV-2

9. Create a staffing plan

Community Homes (cont.)

Guidance for Direct Service Providers, Caregivers, Parents, and People with Developmental and Behavioral Disorders

 Special considerations may be needed for people with developmental and behavioral disorders who have limited mobility, have difficulty accessing information, require close contact with Direct Service Providers, have trouble understanding information, have difficulties with changes in routines, or have other concerns related to their disability.

Guidance for Group Homes for Individuals with Disabilities

CDC has guidance for long-term care facilities and nursing homes, assisted living facilities, retirement communities and independent living facilities, and shared or congregate housing. Many of the recommendations for COVID-19 described in these documents also apply to GHs. GH administrators may consider implementing several strategies to encourage behaviors that reduce the spread of COVID-19.



- Communicate to staff and residents.
- Plan for accommodations, modifications, and assistance for GH residents.
- Follow guidance for Direct Service Providers (DSPs).
- Screen and advise residents, staff, and essential volunteers.
- Plan for essential outings.
- Continue medical care for underlying conditions.
- Consider limiting the number of non-essential visitors.
- Manage stress and anxiety.
- Prepare for Staff Shortage.



Plan for accommodations, modifications, and assistance for GH residents.

- Social distancing and isolating within a GH may be difficult for many people with disabilities.
- Wearing <u>masks</u> may be difficult for people with sensory, cognitive, or behavioral issues. Masks are not recommended for children under 2 or anyone who has trouble breathing or is unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove the covering without assistance.
- Residents may require assistance or visual and verbal reminders for the mouth and nose with a tissue, throwing it in the trash, and washing hands afterwards.
- <u>Cleaning and disinfecting</u> may affect those with sensory or respiratory issues.
- Hand washing or using a hand sanitizer containing at least 60% alcohol may require assistance or supervision.
- Cleaning and disinfecting may require assistance or supervision.

Because of their often extensive and close contact with vulnerable individuals in healthcare settings, a conservative approach to HCP monitoring and applying work restrictions is recommended...

- 1. Definition of a higher-risk exposure for HCP (Community-related exposure, Household exposure, Exposure in the healthcare setting while at work)
- How and when work exclusion and quarantine should occur for HCP who neither meet criteria as fully vaccinated <u>nor</u> have a history of COVID-19 in the prior 3 months
- Criteria for reducing work exclusion for HCP with higher-risk exposure to mitigate staffing shortages
- 4. How and when work exclusion and quarantine should occur for asymptomatic HCP who meet criteria as fully vaccinated <u>or</u> have a history of COVID-19 in the prior 3 months
- 5. Testing HCP for SARS-CoV-2
- 6. Decision-support algorithm for response to exposed HCP

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Community Participation Supports: Day Programs (cont.)

Guidance for Adult Day Services Centers, Strategies for Administrators and Staff to Prevent the Spread of COVID-19

- Adult Day Services Centers (ADSCs) provide social or health services to community-dwelling adults aged 65 and over and adults of any age living with disability.
- Older adults and persons with disabilities are at highest risk for severe illness from COVID-19 including hospitalization, intensive care, and death.
- ADSC administrators and staff can help protect themselves and program participants (that is, adults attending ADSCs) from COVID-19 by promoting and engaging in preventive behaviors that reduce spread and maintain healthy operations and environments at ADSC facilities.

Day Programs



Promote behaviors that reduce spread

- Encourage COVID-19 vaccination
- Stay home when appropriate
- Wear a mask and assist participants in wearing theirs
- Wash your hands often, and ensure participants can wash their hands appropriately

Maintaining healthy environments

- Ventilation
- Cleaning and disinfecting
- Restrooms
- Shared kitchens and dining rooms
- Water systems

Maintain healthy operations

- Reinforce prevention strategies using signs and messages throughout the facility
- Health screening
- Isolate and transport staff and participants who have symptoms while at the ADSC
- Notify health officials and close contacts
- Modify layouts
- Physical barriers and guides
- Activities
- Transportation

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Day Programs (cont.)

Participants at Adult Day Services Centers and their Caregivers

- Participants (adults who attend ADSCs) and their caregivers can also take steps to protect themselves and their loved ones by helping reduce the spread of COVID-19 at ADSC facilities and at home.
 - Get a COVID-19 vaccine
 - Wear a mask and stay 6 feet apart
 - Wash your hands
 - Stay safe when using transportation



Transportation – All Service Types

Protect Yourself When Using Transportation

- For all types of transportation
- Public transit
- Rideshare, carpool, taxi, limo for-hire vehicle passengers
- Shared automobiles, rental cars, scooters, skateboards, and other micro-mobility devices
- Personal vehicles
- Paratransit services
- Personal bikes, walking, wheelchair rolling, or moving with mobility assistive devices

Modify layouts

Arrange tables and chairs to allow for <u>physical distancing</u>. People from the same household
can be in groups together. Space seating at least 6 feet apart. Provide visual cues such as tape
or chalk to guide spacing.

An individualized approach for COVID-19 may be needed for individuals with physical and intellectual disabilities who have limited mobility and difficulty accessing information, require close contact with direct service providers, have trouble understanding information, have difficulties with changes in routines, or have other concerns related to their disability. This approach should account for the following:

- Social distancing and isolating within a GH may be difficult for many people with disabilities.
- Wearing <u>masks</u> may be difficult for people with sensory, cognitive, or behavioral issues. Masks are not recommended for children under 2 or anyone who has trouble breathing or is unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove the covering without assistance.

As a DSP, your risk of exposure will depend on factors including the setting you work in, the number of people you provide services to, and the spread of COVID-19 in your community. Check with your employer for any specific policies and procedures related to COVID-19 and practice everyday prevention actions when working with clients without suspected or confirmed COVID-19. 🚍 Stay safe when using transportation

- Avoid group transportation, if possible. If not possible, follow CDC's transportation guidance.
- Use all necessary precautions such as wearing a <u>mask</u>, <u>physical distancing</u>, and good <u>hand</u> <u>hygiene</u>. For public transportation, please refer to <u>CDC's mask requirement</u>.
- Stay at least 6 feet from the driver and other passengers if possible.
- Avoid riding with unmasked drivers or passengers.

Transportation

- Schedule and stagger drop off or pick up times for participants to avoid crowding.
- Encourage <u>physical distancing</u> among staff and participants at the entrance and exit during these drop off and pick up times with use of visual cues like tapes and signs.
- Transport and bus drivers should practice all safety actions and protocols as indicated for other workers (for example, <u>hand hygiene</u>, <u>masks</u>).
 - Follow guidance for <u>bus transit operators</u> to clean buses or other transport vehicles.
 - Seat participants at least 6 feet apart while in transport vehicles.
 - Drivers should provide ventilation by opening the windows or setting the air ventilation/air conditioning on non-recirculation mode when the vehicle is in service.
 - Paratransit drivers should take extra care in transporting patients with special needs and take all necessary safety precautions to prevent COVID-19. Please visit <u>What Paratransit</u> <u>Operators Need to Know about COVID-19</u> for more information.
 - Create participant pods (keeping small groups together) to limit mixing and create distance between passengers on buses, vans and other transport vehicles (for example, skip rows) when possible.

ODP Expectations



Providers

- Holistic review of individuals served, staff employed, and service provision setting to incorporate CDC and DOH guidelines into policies as appropriate.
 - Understand the ripple effect of your policy decisions
- Timely and Consistent Communication about Policies and Procedures
 - All individuals and families
 - All providers providing services to individuals
 - Except as provided by guidance, providers must allow family visits.
- Recommendations, <u>not</u> requirements
 - Does not replace any federal, state, or local public health and safety laws, rules, and regulations
 - If CDC and DOH guidance conflicts, DOH guidance should be followed as they are the lead agency of the COVID-19 response for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.



ODP Expectations (cont.)

Do I have to follow the guidance?

- ODP will view the totality of the situation and within the appropriate context.
- Was the decision made in collaboration with subject matter experts, in communication with, and within the context of the larger system of service provision?
- If not following the recommendations would result in not meeting the requirements of existing ODP regulations then appropriate action will be taken.

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ODP Expectations (cont.)

What about Department, Administrative Entity and Supports Coordination access to community homes and day programs?

- Providers may not refuse access to:
 - Department staff including licensing and other regional office staff
 - Administrative Entity Staff
 - Supports Coordinators conducting individual monitoring
- Access for inspections, investigations and individual monitoring may not be denied.
- Alternatives to mitigate risk may be requested and negotiated including:
 - Masking, screening required
 - You may ask vaccination status but response is not required
 - Meeting outdoors for monitoring and interviews
 - Limiting number of external parties on-site at one time
 - Request a scheduled start and end time

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ODP Expectations (cont.)

Individuals and Families

- Providers communicate with you about their policies and procedures and keep you updates as policies and procedures change
 - Except as provided by guidance, providers must allow family visits.
- You have a right to request appropriate risk mitigation strategies from your service provider
 - Masking, screening, etc.
 - You may ask vaccination status of staff but response is not required

 Any individual over the age of 12 has been provided with the opportunity for COVID-19 vaccination. SCOs should have reached out to each individual with education and resources for vaccination.
