

# Eligibility Navigation Tool

Disclaimer: This tool was developed to guide counties/AEs to certify eligibility requirements for Targeted Supports Management (TSM), and to certify eligibility for waiver services for a) individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ID), b) Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD), c) children 8 and under with a developmental disability, and d) individuals with a complex medical condition. It was not developed to be inclusive of all potential scenarios that may be encountered to certify this information. It is no longer necessary to send questions directly to ODP (including BSASP) unless, after using this tool, there is still uncertainty about whether an individual meets eligibility requirements.

- Performance that is more than two standard deviations below the mean of a standardized general intelligence test, which reflects the verbal and performance scores, in addition to the Full-Scale IQ score of 70 or below, or
- Performance that is slightly above two standard deviations below the mean of a standardized general intelligence test during a period when the individual manifests serious impairments of adaptive functioning.
- Notes: Individuals with an intellectual disability have scores of approximately two standard deviations or more below the population mean, including a margin for measurement error (generally +/- 5 points). On tests with a standard deviation of 15 and a mean of 100, this involves a score of 65 to 75 (70 +/- 5). Clinical training and judgement are required to interpret test results and assess intellectual performance. - Diagnostic tools usually rely on two main sources of information—parents' or caregivers' descriptions of their child's development and a professional's observation of the child's behavior.
- Parents' concerns are generally valid and are predictive of developmental delays. Research has shown that parental concerns detect 70% to 80% of children with disabilities.
- What if there is a substantial time period between the diagnosis date and the application date?
  - An evaluation completed for an adult when they were young to substantiate the autism diagnosis is acceptable.
  - Tools completed when applicant was young is acceptable. Only adaptive needs to reflect current level of functioning
- What if someone is diagnosed with Aspergers or PDD-NOS?
  - Although Aspergers or PDD-NOS is not formally recognized as Autism within the DSM-5, they are acceptable diagnoses as they fall within the spectrum.
- Is a diagnostic tool or rating scale different than MA-51?
  - Yes. A diagnostic tool and rating scales are used to diagnose someone. A MA-51 is a medical evaluation that is completed annually for re-certification of need for ICF/ID or ICF/ORC level of care.
- Is a provisional diagnosis acceptable? How long is a provisional diagnosis valid? Does the eval need a signature?
  - Yes. We already know that diagnosing someone without a standardized assessment is imperfect. Therefore, we are relying on the qualified professionals to use clinical judgment to Certify the diagnosis. While not good practice, a provisional specifier can be used when they are not 100% certain and could potentially be a replacement for DSM-5 no longer annoying "not otherwise specified."
